

During July extensive excavations were carried out at the Fort using contractors. The aim of the work was to reveal features that had been lost behind the East-Wing Battery buried since the 1980s as a result of illegal dumping and bulldozing of the original earthworks. The original access roadway to the Wing Battery has been revealed along with the true levels behind the gun emplacements. The soil removed has allowed for a substantial section of the missing earth ramparts to be rebuilt behind the Wing Battery and around the well, linking the two



Also achieved was the removal of all the tree stumps from the West side of the main Fort Glacis allowing for future landscaping work to be done. The impact of this work is spectacular when viewed for the first time. The excavation work had to be monitored at all times as part of the Scheduled Monument Consent, however no significant

archaeological finds were made.

When and how did you start your collaboration with Slough Fort?

I started back in 2015, when it was a Parish led project. I had been a volunteer at Fort Amherst in Chatham and was asked by a couple of their Trustees who live in Allhallows to come and give them hand at Slough, the rest is history as they say.

Can you tell us about a time when the restoration work has been challenging?

There was a large water tank called a Braithwaite tank, on top of the Glacis. We had to remove it when we cleared the Glacis. It was made up of approx. 120 steel panels, which were 3ftx3ft and had 16 bolts on each side of each panel.



We dismantled it, and it was shipped to a Heritage Railway in Wales, but it took many hours and people and was difficult as you were working at the top of the Glacis and every bolt was seized, but it was good to see it going somewhere else to be used.



What would you recommend for people who are wishing to visit Slough Fort?

There is so much to see at Slough, as it covers many different time periods, my favourite area is as you walk through the main doors of the Fort, which are original, it almost feels like you are stepping back in time. Also the grounds and the varied fauna and flora we have there, including our new community orchard.

What is your goal for Slough Fort for the future?

To see it restored and being used by future generations for different activities.
