

A genuine piece of the B17 44-6133, which crashed in Allhallows in 1944, was given to Slough Fort this year by Dave Brocklehurst MBE, the Curator of The Kent Battle of Britain, via Mitch Peeke.

Mitch Peeke has been passionately involved in the history of the B17 and has successfully helped to organise a Commemoration Ceremony gathering some of the relatives of the pilots who sadly died in the Thames waters. In fact, we now have a permanent memorial to those men, overlooking the place where they fell. This poignant memorial is situated in Allhallows Leisure Park, near the Yacht Club.

The armour plate measures 17 by 19 inches and weighs 10 kg.

It is said to be the seat base armour from either of the Pilots' seats. The plate was salvaged from the wreck site, a muddy, watery crater some 500 yards off the beach at Allhallows, in the late 1970's. Today, the crater is still visible at low tide, as are the fragmented remains of the B17. Slough Fort has now two tangible pieces of the B17 44-6133 thanks to the kindness of remarkable history lovers who dedicate their lives to preserve and protect our heritage.
