
Queen Elizabeth II 1926-2022

THE MORNING POST, WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 27, 1895.

THE DROWNING OF TWO ARTILLERYMEN. - An official inquiry was held by the military authorities at Chatham yesterday into the circumstances under which Corporal Clarke and Gunner Haycock were drowned in the Thames during the gale on Saturday night. The Artillery-men were stationed at Hoo Fort, some miles from Chatham, and in company with Gunner Clarke left in a boat to fetch their master gunner, Owen, from Slough Fort. The night was very dark and rough, and on the return journey the boat suddenly foundered and precipitated the four men into the water. Owen and Gunner Clarke swam ashore and landed in a very exhausted condition. Haycock's body was recovered on Monday night. On Sunday Mr. W. L. Wyllie, the artist, endeavoured to find the bodies by dragging, but his boat was capsized, and he was rescued by a barge boat.

Summer facelift
